Show Chairman, Des Allen, said it more than achieved the aim of encouraging more farming involvement this year, helped by the increase in participation across the board.

The Society also handed out grants to agriculture students as part of its annual awards event, which is an important part of the day.

He said: "It was a wonderful occasion on Saturday, but what stood out to me was how many more people were taking part in the many competitions. The competition element is at the heart of what the County Show is all about, so the fact that so many people, especially younger people, were willing to participate indicates how important the Show is to the local farming community.

"The membership of the Society is also rising, we had more trade stands than before and the Showground was really full and remained busy all day, so all in all, there were plenty of healthy signs which can only be good for the event in the long term.

"It was my first year as Show Chairman and I had a fabulous day. The team worked extremely hard to organise everything and it was great to see their efforts rewarded."

Without pausing to draw breath, the team here are moving on to our Summer events calendar which sees the return of many favourites. Strong exhibitor support as Midlands Machinery Show gears up for 10th anniversary

Midlands Machinery Show exhibitors are demonstrating strong support for the event's tenth anniversary with 150 stands already booked at the Newark Showground this November.

The topics that matter most to those working within farming and the agricultural machinery sector will be well reflected at this year's event, including consideration about what impact the result of the general election is likely to have over the next five years.

With a huge amount of focus being placed on the Sustainable Farming Incentive and new opportunities for farmers to use their land's natural capital, the National Farmers' Union will again host an Environment Conference on the first day of the Show.



The safe operation of machinery, both in the field and on the road, will be covered by experts from LANTRA, Western Power and Lincolnshire Police. Advice will be on hand for operators and employers to help them stay safe and on the right side of the law.

Long-standing exhibitors – some who have been part of the show since its inception in 2014 – will contribute to a diverse range of stands.

One of the many companies returning is Witham Group, which has exhibited its range of lubricants and paints at the Midlands Machinery Show since its inception and will again be here in November for the two-day event.

Six Simple Steps to Regenerative Agriculture

Whilst there is no universally agreed definition for "regenerative agriculture", there are 5 core principles:

- 1. Limit soil disturbance
- 2. Keep the soil surface covered
- 3. Increase the diversity of plants
- 4. Keep living roots in the soil
- 5. Integrate livestock into the system

By implementing these principles, the aim is to:

- Regenerate the health of soils
- Regenerate the land and ecosystems
- Generate knowledge, collaboration and relationships
- Generate healthy and resilient food and farming solutions
- Generate value
- Generate climate change solutions

The 6th principle – 'context' is increasingly being included and indeed, the 'site specific' nature of farming underpins LEAF's IFM approach. Context recognises that each farm is unique and must be managed according to specific conditions, needs and goals. This principle is critical for ensuring the success and sustainability of farm management practices, as it emphasises the importance of considering the unique conditions of each farm and tailoring management practices accordingly.

Eton Mess Scones

Take the classic strawberry, clotted cream and meringue combo and serve it on easy-to-make scones- irresistible

Prep 20 mins / 15 mins to cook

Serves 12

Ingredients

- 400g self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting
- ¼ tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 100g butter, cut into cubes
- 3 tbsp caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling
- 200ml buttermilk
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 5 tbsp milk, plus extra for brushing
- good handful small strawberries,
- small jar good strawberry jam
- 2 meringue nests, crumbled into chunks
- 200ml tub clotted cream

Method

- Heat oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Mix the flour, salt and baking powder together in a large bowl. Rub in the butter or whizz the lot in a food processor to fine crumbs, then stir in the sugar.
- Warm the buttermilk, vanilla and milk to hand temperature, then quickly stir it into the flour mixture with a knife. Using your hands, bring the dough together, being careful not to overwork the mix.
- Turn dough out onto a lightly floured work surface and pat out to a 2.5cm thick round. Stamp out 12 x 5cm rounds, dusting the cutter with flour as you stamp - you'll need to repat trimmings to make 12. Put the rounds onto floured baking sheets, brush the tops with milk and sprinkle with a little more sugar. Bake for 12-15 mins until golden

To serve, lightly mash the strawberries with the jam, and fold the meringues into the clotted cream. Dollop some strawberry mixture onto each split scone, and top with a dollop of meringue cream.
