

# WHAT DOES THE FUTURE HOLD FOR NNAS?

Simon Eccleston, CEO at NNAS gives an insight into what the Society is doing to help the agricultural industry and communities and what the future holds for NNAS.

"It is our role to support and help develop the industry, as well as educating the public on the many roles of agriculture in society. But to do that we have to make sure we adapt and understand the needs of the farming, rural and public sectors" says Simon.

The NNAS held a working group in early summer 2021. "We sat down with stakeholders from all different backgrounds, ages, and professions to cement our mission of promoting, celebrating and championing agriculture across the Midlands region."

#### They identified three key objectives:

- 1. Promote and publicise the industry to build better working relationships while raising the public's understanding of agriculture.
- 2. Encourage a sustainable and thriving future by supporting education, employment, research and training.
- 3. Recognise, encourage and support the mental, physical and social well-being of rural communities.

"We'd been making changes in the background for the past few years," explains Simon. "Shows are still a large part of the Society's role, so we've moved away from a focus on numbers through the gate to focusing on relevance.

Creating specialist and niche shows like the Midlands Machinery Show and the Newark Vintage Tractor & Heritage Show allows us to tailor the content and bring together relevant people, businesses and organisations which better serves everyone."

The Society also funds awards and grants to support young people through its Education Development Grant and Midlands Agricultural Engineering Apprenticeship Awards. And it will continue to build relationships with tractor manufacturers, organisations and education providers to sponsor individuals and courses which a college may not necessarily provide.

It's vital to both listen and collaborate to create an organisation that's fit for purpose, he adds.

"If we listen – especially to the young people whose futures are being shaped – and work together, we will all benefit, and the Society will be able to remain as a robust support."

### 75 YEARS OF GREY FERGIE AT THE VINTAGE TRACTOR SHOW

Newark Vintage Tractor and Heritage Machinery Show on 13 and 14 November.

Friends of Ferguson Heritage are hoping to have as many very, very early tractors from the first days and weeks of production in 1946, according to FOFH chairman Rob Sowden.

Among them will be the magnificent Number 33 from Colin Taylor in Northern Ireland which has been restored using almost all parts from its year of manufacture in 1946. Mr Taylor says that the only parts which don't date back to 1946 are the fuel, oil and battery.

Also crossing the Irish Sea will be Raymond Browne's newly restored Number 6 which rolled off the line in the first week of production. The vehicle was found in 2019 buried under brambles and its visit to England will be its first since restoration was completed just months ago.

The vehicles offer an insight into a war-torn Britain dogged by fractured supply lines and material shortages. For example, both TE20s on show have 20hp Continental engines because the planned Standard version was not available in time to meet the production schedule.

## UNIVERSITY OF SHEFFIELD'S SUSTAINABLE FOOD

University of Sheffield's Institute for Sustainable Food leads £6m research project to transform the UK food system.

Food security and sustainability are among the greatest challenges facing the world today, and traditional approaches of intensifying food production are coming under criticism for not looking at the whole picture of how we produce, and supply food to the nation.

The Covid-19 pandemic also shone a light on the fragility of the UK's food systems resilience and how its reliance on foreign imports during a global crisis meant people in the UK experienced empty shelves, and shortages of basic staples such as flour and pasta.

Their research project titled "Healthy soil, healthy food, healthy people (H3)" seeks to transform the UK food system from the ground up via an integrated programme of interdisciplinary research.

It will focus on improvements to sustainability and resilience within horticulture, hydroponics and hybrid farms. The project will also focus on the health benefits for people living in the UK that could be gained by transforming UK agriculture and the impact of our food systems on the environment.

The project will identify practical paths towards food system interventions: on farm, in food manufacturing and retail, and improve dietary health and environmental sustainability of the agri-food industry in the UK.

This will include finding ways to increase the production of health-promoting vegetables, while reducing reliance on harmful agricultural inputs and imported food by integrating hydroponic production systems within conventional soil-based farms.

The project will also look at how improving the microbiomes of growing mediums has the potential to increase nutrients in our food systems and reduce our reliance on pesticides.

This is an exciting, once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to use cutting-edge research to have a genuinely transformative effect on the health and sustainability of the UK food system.

### Boost for First Aid Treatment Centre

Newark Community First Aid (NCFA) are delighted to have received a very generous donation in support of their latest project to build a new First Aid Treatment Centre at Newark Showground. NCFA are working in partnership with the Society.

Representatives of the two charities met to discuss the progress of the project at the Hexgreave Hall Estate, the home of Mr Tony Strawson, who attended along with his brother Mr David Strawson who are both Past-Presidents of NNAS.

Philip Jessop outlined the plans and progress for the new £85,000 First Aid Treatment Centre which will replace the current first aid post that is reaching the end of its operational life. The new Centre will be a five-bay modular building relocated on the Showground making it more accessible for use at more events. The building will have improved access and facilities.

After the briefing Mr Tony Strawson was pleased to report that he had already held an event at which he had highlighted the project and along with friends and colleagues had raised £3000 which his brother David had agreed to match. Dr McDougald thanked the brothers for their very welcome support and their most generous donation of £6,000.

Philip Jessop said "This is a tremendous boost to our fundraising, Tony and David explained their lifelong relationship with the Nottinghamshire County Show and the Agricultural Society, having visited first with their parents over 70 years ago. Their support and that of others will enable us to provide much improved facilities, allowing our volunteers to give the highest standards of care. The Treatment Centre will enhance further the facilities on the Showground cementing its position as the premier East Midlands Events Centre."

Newark Community First Aid are now asking people to support the Big Give 'Christmas Challenge' – this is a matched funding campaign centred on the week 30th November to 7th December 2021.

Philip Jessop said "we have secured £2,000 in pledges from local supporters and are waiting to hear if the Big Give will add another £2,000. We are hopeful that they will. In order to release these pledges we need to raise £4,000 during the Challenge week. We are asking if people can organise a fundraising event or donate that week -we can then double their donations - we would be delighted to send people information on the campaign and how they can donate.

Warm up as those cold nights set in with this autumnal soup.



Prep:35 mins Cook:1 hr Serves 4



#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 pumpkin, about 1.5-2kg (save the seeds - toast them in a dry pan to serve as a topping)
- 1tbsp garam masala
- 2tsp ground coriander
- 2tsp ground cumin
- ½-1tsp chilli flakes or powder, plus a pinch
- 3tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- · ginger, peeled and finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 900ml veg stock
- 100ml double cream or crème fraiche, plus extra to serve

#### **METHOD**

#### STEP 1

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Cut the pumpkin in half and remove the seeds with a spoon. Cut into wedges or chunks (keep the skin on) and tip into a bowl. Put the garam masala, and 1 tsp each of the coriander and cumin into a small bowl and mix with 2 tbsp of the oil and season.

Drizzle over the pumpkin and toss well to coat in the spiced oil. Transfer to a baking tray, spread out evenly and roast for 40-45 mins, turning halfway through cooking, until the pumpkin is very soft when pierced with a fork. Leave to cool on the tray for a few minutes.

#### STEP 2

Heat the remaining 1 tbsp olive oil in a large saucepan and fry the onion with a pinch of salt for 10 mins until soft. Add the ginger, garlic and remaining spices and chilli flakes, and fry for a few more minutes until fragrant. Pour in the stock and bring to a gentle simmer.

#### STEP 3

When the pumpkin is cool enough to touch, use a spoon to scoop the soft flesh from the skins. Add the soft pumpkin to the stock pan, discarding the skins. Remove from the heat and blitz the soup with a hand blender until creamy and smooth. Season to taste, adding extra chilli or garam masala if you like. Put back over a low heat and stir in the cream. Bring to a gentle simmer, then serve in bowls with a drizzle more cream and a pinch of chilli to serve. Top with toasted pumpkin seeds, if you like.


