Vintage Tractor Show Stories

Two-seater tractor claims modified class win

People have modified tractors to suit their needs since the advent of farm machinery – and the new class 'Best Modified Tractor' added at the last years Show recognised the most innovative designs.

The winning vehicle – a two-seater Massey Ferguson 135 – was designed and built by Alan Hopkins for his son David, who was born with glaucoma.

While David used to be able to drive, his eyesight is deteriorating, but Alan still wants to take him on tractor runs and for him to be part of it.

Built in 1972, the 135 was in a poor state, Alan stripped it down completely, set about widening the rear end to fit two seats in the cab, adjusted the steering so it could be driven from the right-hand side, and moved the pedals. The whole job took about two years.

"It's got two steering wheels, but the one on the left is a dummy, for David to hold," added Alan. "To my knowledge, it's the only two-seater 135 out there."



Celebrating Scammell's role in Britain's industrial

Commercial vehicles have played a tremendous role in Britain's industrial past – and a great selection were on display at the Show as we celebrated Scammell Lorries.

Scammell, which developed an articulated six-wheeled low-loader after WW1 and went on to produce the three-wheeled Mechanical Horse to replace horses in rail, postal and other delivery applications. This evolved into the Scammell Scarab, with the single front wheel offering exceptional manoeuvrability and the rounded steel cab providing driver comfort.

Matt Baker bought his Scarab in 2002 – originally built in 1967 for use at Mersey docks moving goods around the harbour, it had more recently found use on classic film sets.

At the time, Matt was volunteering at The Great Central Railway in Leicestershire, so he repainted the Scarab into British Railway's grey livery to exhibit at the Mountsorrel & Rothley Heritage Community Centre.



Rare Porsche tractor catches the eye

Mention the brand Porsche and the first thing that springs to mind will likely be a sports car. But the German manufacturer also produced a range of innovative tractors from the early 1930s until 1963, a rare example of which was on display at The Newark Vintage Tractor & Heritage Show.

"It was rescued from a hedge in Washington, when we bought it in 2019 – it wasn't running and was really scrap, but we brought it back to life," says Seamus O'Dwyer, who co-owns it with fellow enthusiast Donie Fitzgerald. The 1959 Porsche Master 408, powered by a 50hp diesel engine, is one of only 200 built – of which only four remain, with just one in the UK, to their knowledge.

"This one is a show pony — we got it ready just for the Concours d'Elegance at the Show and have a bit more to do to finish it off," says Seamus, who also owns a Massey Ferguson 168 and a John Deere 310.

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MMS Recap: New products and talking points

New products and talking points were at the Midlands Machinery Show as it celebrated its tenth anniversary

Farmers and exhibitors converged on Newark Showground in their thousands for the tenth Midlands Machinery Show last November.

Many attendees had returned from the London Farmer's rally earlier that week, keen to discuss what the budget would mean for their future business investments with fellow farmers and the trade.

More than 220 exhibitors set up stands across the site offering machinery demonstrations and professional advice, as well as showcasing new products.



New products and propositions

For some exhibitors, the event was an opportunity to display new products for the first time.

Both Chandlers and B&B Tractors took the opportunity to debut the Valtra S416.

Valtra Dealer Principal at Chandlers, Shane Lowe, said: "The technology options are fully customisable through Valtra's Unlimited Studio, including automatic levelling for linkage–mounted fertiliser spreaders and automatic headland turn modes."



Budget talking points

The ongoing fallout from Labour's budget was a hot topic of conversation across the Showground. Held just 24 hours after the London Farmer's protest against the budget, exhibitors acknowledged the challenging environment and said it would take time for confidence to return.



A plan for water

The NFU Midlands Environment Conference 'Water: Under Pressure' took place on the first day of the Show, discussing the challenges landowners face in maintaining a ready supply of one of their key resources in the future.

Dr Georgina Key from Severn Trent Water outlined how population growth, climate change and extreme weather are expected to put more pressure on water provision in the future.

Paul Carrott from Dyson Farming believes the concept of 'water in – water out' is key to farming successfully in the future. However, he revealed that getting projects off the ground can be tricky and therefore working with other farmers is essential.

"Collaboration is going to be key," he added. "You need to be sitting down with other farmers and talking about what you're going to do."

Farmer and agronomist Kate Mayne shared her experiences of encouraging farmer engagement, before the NFU's Mark Betson issued a warning that abstractors need to start planning for the future now, as the Environment Agency will be able to change licenses from 2028 without paying compensation.



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Young People and Succession Planning

How do we overcome barriers for the next generation of farmers?

Succession issues are often thought about, but the topic can be challenging to discuss and put into practice.

The Royal Agricultural Society of England (RASE) have launched a Bitesize Guide on 'Young people and succession planning: Overcoming barriers for the next generation of farmers', which brings together key findings from several Nuffield Scholarship reports to provide guidance on the issue.

The guide is part of a collaboration between RASE and the Nuffield Farming Scholarship Trust.

It includes an exploration of:

- The situations which lead to succession discussions
- Approaches to begin the process of forming a succession plan
- The merits of using a facilitator for family discussions
- How to make it fair for non-farming siblings
- The different land tenure models which might be considered

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Midlands Agricultural Engineering Apprenticeship Award Winners

The latest young technicians to be supported by the Midlands Agricultural Engineering Apprenticeship Awards were recognised again at the Midlands Machinery Show.

The winners, aged 17 to 25 are supported with a bursary to assist with their career development, receiving a total of £500 paid in two instalments of £250 over two years.

A total of 12 apprentices collected their awards from the Newark & Notts Agricultural Society (NNAS) at a special ceremony on the second day of the Show.

NNAS President Bob Sheldon said: "Investing in the next generation of agricultural engineers is crucial in today's rapidly-changing landscape. These young apprentices represent the future of farming and the awards create valuable opportunities for them to further their expertise and industry knowledge."

Apprentices from dealers Chandlers, Farol, B&B Tractors, Russells and Sharmans were selected for bursaries this year.

Tom Smith from AgCo dealer B&B Tractors in Barnsley said: "I'm into the third year of my apprenticeship now and I'm learning loads. I want to keep learning and working my way up the ladder. It's nice to be recognised for this award."



Harry Bassett from John Deere dealer Farol in Ashbourne said: "Winning this means a lot to me because I'll be able to buy some special tools to improve what I do and also get some recognition within the dealership and industry. I want to progress and my goal is to become a master technician."



Joining Tom and Harry at the ceremony were Chandlers apprentices Robert Marlow, William Vines, Joshua Whotton and Nathan Wells.

B&B Tractors had three further apprentices at the ceremony; Henry Bowman, Joe Slater and Joe Sweetmore. Cameron Sirrell and Max Lumsden from Russells also collected their bursaries, as well as Lewis Collins from Sharmans Agricultural.

The awards, which were introduced by Geoffrey Bond during his presidency with the support of the NNAS, are organised in support of the Society's charitable objectives, to promote, celebrate and champion primary agriculture and related industries.

Ingredients

- 30g unsalted butter
- · Olive oil for frying
- 2 large leeks sliced
- 1 large garlic clove crushed
- 2 x 400g cans butter beans drained and rinsed
- 800ml hot chicken or vegetable stock
- 4 tbsp crème fraîche plus extra to serve
- 225g chorizo finely cubed
- 4 rosemary sprigs leaves picked and finely chopped
- Bread to serve

Leek, Butter Bean & Crispy Chorizo Soup

Blend leeks and butter beans to make this filling winter soup. Top with crispy chorizo and rosemary for a final flourish and serve with crusty bread.

Prep 10 mins / 30 mins to cook

Serves 6

Method

- Heat the butter and a glug of olive oil in a casserole over a medium heat. Add the leeks and fry for 15 mins until softened and beginning to turn golden brown. Stir through the garlic and cook for a further 1 min.
- 2 Tip the butter beans into the pan, pour over the hot stock and simmer, uncovered, for 10 mins. Blitz to a smooth consistency with a hand-held blender, then stir in the crème fraîche and season to taste. Keep warm over a low heat.
- Meanwhile, fry the chorizo in a small glug of olive oil in a frying pan over a medium heat for 5 mins or until oily and crispy. Stir in the rosemary, cooking for a further minute. Ladle the soup into bowls and top with the rosemary and chorizo mixture, as well as any oil left in the pan. Serve with some crusty bread.
