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# NOTTINGHAMSHIRE COUNTY SHOW'S "HUGE SUCCESS" WILL HELP SUPPORT LOCAL FARMING COMMUNITIES

Here at the Society, we are delighted to say Nottinghamshire County Show was a huge success – and will help us support regional farmers whose work puts food on families' tables across the UK.

More than 15,000 people attended the one-day event in May, drawn by its mix of animals, entertainment, food, music and competitions.

It was the 138th time the show has been held and among the highlights of the day were a performance from the Barlow Red Barrows, a bumper turn-out in the livestock competitions and a fly past from a Spitfire and Hawker Hurricane from the RAF Battle of Britain Memorial Flight. There was also food and drink on sale from local suppliers, live farriering competitions and the return of the Young Farmers' Clubs' popular lawnmower racing.

## STUDY SEEKS UK FARMERS' FEEDBACK ON IMPACTS OF BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS

New research by national charity The Farming Community Network (FCN) seeks to better understand the impact of bovine tuberculosis (bTB) on UK farmers' health and wellbeing.

The study is exploring the emotional, financial and physical impacts of bTB and the long-term ramifications these may have had on the farmer, farm family or farm business.

The researchers are also hoping to hear about farmers' experiences of government policies to control and eradicate bTB.

As part of the research FCN is running a survey that will help the charity to better understand how farmers and farm families perceive the threat of bTB – helping to improve its support to those at risk or affected by a bTB breakdown.


